Legally Blonde premiered on Broadway in 2007. Based on the 2001 film starring Reese Witherspoon, the show was as big of a hit as the movie, due to its positive message, fun song and dance numbers, and iconic characters. The show features music by Laurence O'Keefe and Nell Benjamin and a book by Heather Hach. It was nominated for 7 Tony Awards and was the most commercially successful show of the year, with a special live performance recorded for MTV. I was lucky enough to be in the audience that night, as any college student wearing pink was admitted for free.

I loved this show the moment I saw it. I can't recall ever having more fun sitting watching a show in a Broadway theater. The colors, the energy, the comedy, the music, and dance -all of it combines for a fun night that leaves you feeling re-invigorated and excited about what live theatre can do for the soul.

Despite source material that is over twenty years old, Elle Woods and her story still resonate today. This is a show about being true to yourself, no matter what, with a healthy dose of girl power mixed in. We meet Elle, who is on top of the world as a senior at UCLA: the homecoming queen who is awaiting an inevitable proposal by her king so they can have the storybook ending everyone envisions for them.

But, instead of a proposal, her life is turned on its end when her boyfriend breaks up with her and moves across the country to attend Harvard Law School, pursuing his own fairytale life that doesn't include Elle.

With the support of her sorority sisters, Elle moves east, gains admittance to Harvard Law and is focused on winning him back. Upon her arrival in Cambridge, she learns that this is not the world she has known and realizes she has a lot to learn to achieve what she wants. Along the way, she befriends a TA (Emmett Forrest) and hair stylist (Paulette) who both help her see that perhaps her journey should be about more than just finding a man, instead maybe finding herself and exploring the full measure of what she can be and letting that be her story.

I love this show. I don't know many people who do not. It's fun, energetic and has a message that is so important. Perhaps it's disappointing that this message still needs to be spread today, as maybe it means we have not lived up to the aspirations of a movie from almost twenty-five years ago. But that does not detract from the import of that message and its need to be repeated.

Speaking for myself, I thought the movie was fun and the show fantastic. I always supported the ideas of this movie, as I was blessed to spend my life around strong women (my mother, a schoolteacher, my two sisters, both doctors, and my wife, a performer,

entrepreneur and mother, chief among them). So, I always loved that this tale was about female empowerment and finding your way in a manner that was true to yourself, no matter what others thought. But, as a father to a three-year-old daughter, this show has new significance to me. I cannot fathom the idea that we live in a world where my daughter, who is smart, funny, resourceful, and full of joy, could ever lack the prospects and advancement opportunities of men in the same school or profession as her. It doesn't even compute as something that could be possible, much less a sad reality of what IS, all too often, in this world.
